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Family Center at
Community House
Re-Opens Friday

Counsel of the Family Service Center becomes available at the Birmingham Community House on two days a week beginning Friday, September 5, according to Estela M. Martin, psychiatric social worker and executive secretary in charge of the service in Oakland county. Office hours will be Wednesday and Friday from one until five in the Employment Office.

Since the Family Service Center was established locally on February 1, 1946, it has dealt with approximately 350 cases, about 15 per cent of them originating in Birmingham or Bloomfield Hills.

Most of the cases, Miss Martin said, are pre-divorce husband-wife problems, many referred to the Family Service by the Friend of the Court, or domestic relations court, for Oakland county.

Other problems in which assistance has been given concern parent-child relationship, ill health, emotional, mental or physical, and the budgeting and financial planning aspects of home management. Some people come to the Family Service Center to avoid problems before they develop.

But most, Miss Martin says, unfortunately do not consult until the problem is upon them. The Center's services are free and available to anybody who comes. Consultation is with a single individual, in confidence. Appointments may be made through the Community House or the Pontiac office, Pontiac 6820 but are not necessary.

Six members of the Family Service Center Board, including Paul Averill its chairman, are from Birmingham or Bloomfield Hills. They are Mrs. Paul B. Hoffman, Mrs. T. Hollister Mahly, Mrs. Marc T. Patten, Fred W. Sanders and Mrs. Gustav D. Pope.

The Center has offices in Pontiac at 71½ Saginaw Street.

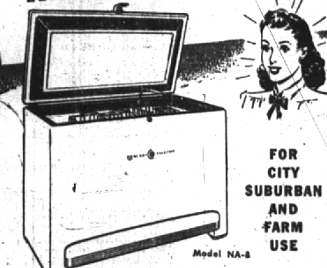
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The NA-8, eight-cubic-foot model, holds up to 280 pounds.

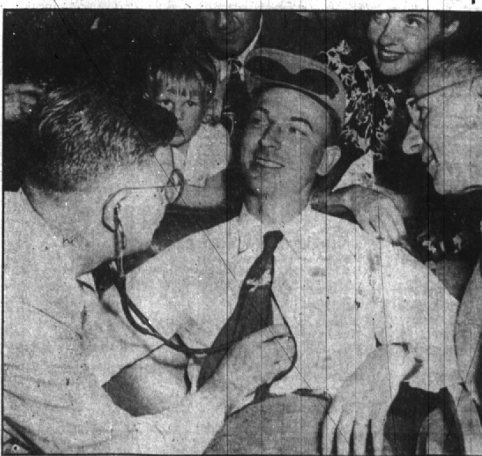
- Handy wire baskets provide convenient storing of frozen food packages.
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
