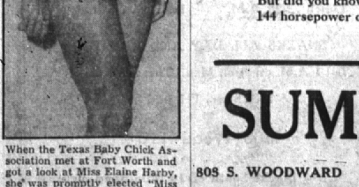
The wedding will be held in the Woodward Avenue Presbyterian church in Detroit at 8 o'clock, after which a reception will be held at the Herman home.

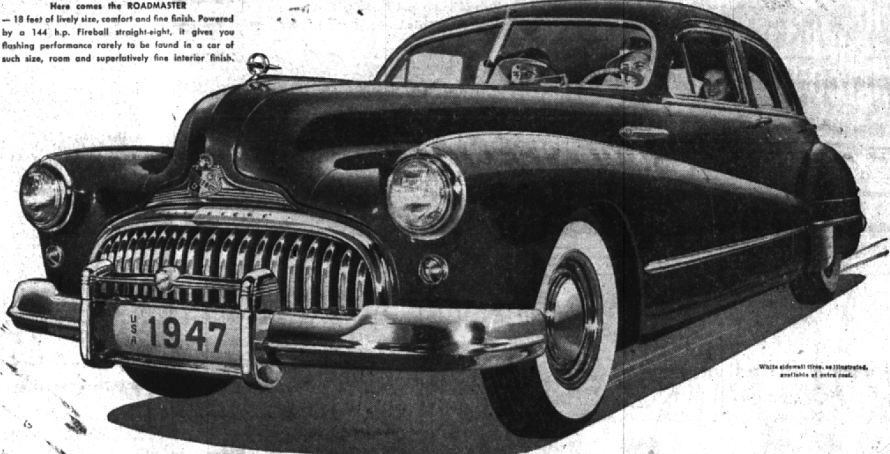


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
