City to Take Part in Drive to Aid Starving Children

Birmingham's division of "Crusade for Children" will be organized early in April, according to Jack Schaefer, Wayne county chairman of \$1,500,000 drive to aid starving children overseas. Plans for organizing the Metropolitan Detroit area of the campaign, sponsored by American Overseas Aid and United Nations Appeal for Children, were completed early this week by the Executive Committee, Schaefer added.

"Our local campaign," said Schaefer, "will raise enough to save the lives of 150,000 children for a whole year, because \$10 will save a child from starvation—by use of diet supplements for twelve months! Our share of the \$10,000,000 national quota is \$1,500,000. A specific goal of Birmingham has not been set."

For Food and Medicine
Funds raised in this campaign, Schaefer pointed out, will be used chiefly for food and medicine, which will be distributed through 26 private foreign relief agencies such as the American Friends Service Committee, American Aid to France, American Aid to Poland, and others.

Schaefer said, "It is our aim to give everyone in the community a chance to be a good neighbor to the children whose well-being determines the future well-being of the world."

Serving on the Executive Committee as chairman is Edward T. Gushers, vice-president of the Detroit Edison company. Prentiss M. Brown, former United States Senator and chairman of the Board at Edison, is a member of the local committee as well as the national board.

Elmer Sylvester, 12-year Birmingham resident, is responsible for the direction of the campaign.

City is Taking Part in National ACS Fund Drive

One out of every eight persons in the country is liable to die from cancer—often before he is 35 years of age. These are the figures shown by the American Cancer Society and are taken from the reports of their many medical centers and other reliable medical information sources.

With these figures in mind, workers today launched their annual drive for funds to fight cancer. Last year was costly. The 188,000 persons who died of cancer in 1947 represented a possible earning power of more than two billion dollars. If it were true, many of these might still have fallen victims of this disease. It is especially true that many others might, today, be well and strong, had they taken proper care of their ailments in its early stages.

To Need Money for Care

To enable these persons to get this proper care, thousands of dollars are needed this year to help cut their bills in half. It is not so long ago that tuberculosis was a feared killer of all time. Today, through early treatment, it is placed well down on the list of feared diseases. The same may become true of cancer. The local drive is being headed by Mrs. Walter E. Powers as general chairman, with captains working in Bloomfield Hills, Beverly Hills, Wing Lake, Bloomfield Village, and Foxcroft. They, and their volunteer co-workers, ask your support. They ask that persons making donations to local workers in order that their quota may be met and the proper medical aid assured for them.

Well over half of the amount raised stays within the area for research in medical treatment, cancer detection, and home aid to those who are found to have the disease. Many lives are being saved each year, but there is still a woeful lack of proper medical care. Many lives are being lost undetected until past certain help. This is due partly to the lack of sufficient facilities and partly to the reticence shown by the public to learn more about cancer.

The American Cancer Society's national office receives a small amount of money from the Birmingham area gives. It goes to support national research movements, equip new laboratories, and the county-wide educational program. The greater part remains here, where it is used on the same lines but directly for the donor of this area.

In addition, a part of it goes for home aid. This includes instruction in the care of the cancer victim in the home by proper medical authorities. It also supplies the victim with free dressings and cancer pads. The money is used locally, and if donated at some other point, its value to this community is increased considerably.
