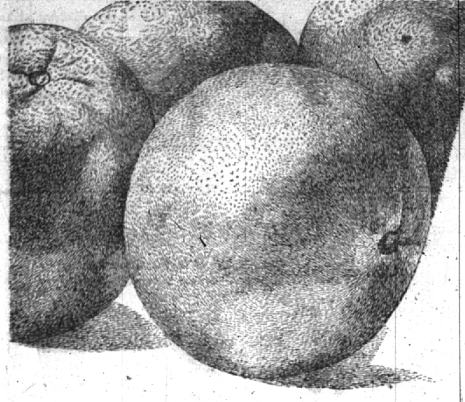

Express Interest in Country-Wide Planning, Zoning

Members of the Oakland County Citizens League met Tuesday at the Birmingham Community House to discuss planning and zoning as it affects the county. They feel that this meeting brought a coordinated county-wide planning arrangement a step nearer, due to the interest taken in the meeting.

In 1946 the State Legislature authorized such a group for each county, which has never been done here. At the meeting a lengthy discussion was held for and against such action, with many important points being brought out and explained in detail. Representatives from nearly every municipality in the county were present, as well as several persons from out of the county.

Unique Opportunity
 Connor said the coordinated plan was a tool to create communities to serve the people. He pointed out that it offers Oakland County a unique opportunity to plan for its future, and to arrange the plans in such a manner that it will be of benefit to all.

"Oakland County's population is on the increase," he said. "It is in a transition period from a rural to an urban county, and must govern its growth in order to have the kind of future it wants."

Several persons recommended the land-use planning, stating in the county zoning whether or not certain tracts will be set aside for agriculture, industry or residential use. Townships, have their voice in this matter, and through careful thought and planning can build a future that will avoid town bled areas, and county-wide zoning, including townships working together, instead of separate and isolated groups, unfavorable buildings or businesses to either can be avoided.

Prepare Resolution
 A resolution was prepared for the board of supervisors that they put this coordinated planning and zoning into action at once. Henry B. Berman, chairman of the League presided over the meeting, and with William Kinnear, president of the Board of Supervisors, took part in the panel discussion.

The meeting was successful in bringing a clearer picture to those present of just what the setup is, what it aims at, and how it can be accomplished if it is put into action. An educational campaign is being planned, which will be available to all interested residents of the county which will explain all these things in such a way as to avoid them here.

Kiwians Told of Dangers of Communism

Communism is an enemy fighting against our American way of life and threatening our very existence as a democracy, stated Larry Davidson, speaking before the Birmingham Kiwanis Club, Tuesday evening. Resigning at attorney for the AFL, after claiming it was headed by racketeers, he said the CIO was largely influenced by Communism.

Davidson revealed how the Russian people have no rights whatsoever; that the secret police suppress the slave labor, without which Russia couldn't exist and that 20,000,000 Russians are in slavery of which 14 per cent die from cruelty every year.

Russia had a democratic government for five years, as an example, Davidson pointed to the Communist strike at the Alvin Chalmers Co. in which the help/bank built Navy material.

Davidson said he will have time to go against this powerful organization, who would destroy it, if we will have time to go against it every day of the year, by remembering that freedom is not missed until we lose it, and then we find that we cannot live without it.

He said every generation must make its contribution toward the fight for liberty. He urged that Birmingham Kiwanis club and all others to help give leadership and inspiration to the American people.

The April 6 meeting will have Lawrence Good as guest speaker. He will talk on "From the Amazon to the Pacific". Charter night has been set for April 25 at the Community House.
