Next Monday, April 19th, at the regular morning meeting of the League of Women Voters, Mrs. Covert Robinson will report on the Michigan Tax Institute held April 7 at East Lansing. This was a short course sponsored by the Department of Economics of Michigan State College in cooperation with the League of Women Voters of Michigan.

Purpose of the session, as explained in the course program, was "to provide an open conference where Michigan citizens may hear and discuss the facts and issues of important problems of taxation and state and local fiscal relations in their own state."

John Perkins, State of Michigan budget director, reviewed the fiscal situation in Michigan. Frank Seidman, CPA of Grand Rapids, spoke on "Michigan Taxation and the Ability-to-Pay Principle". A forum inviting audience participation discussed "Should Michigan have an income tax, as its major source of State revenue?"

Distribution of Funds

Louis H. Schimmel, director of the Michigan Municipal Advisory Service of Detroit, discussed "Standards for Distribution of Funds to Local Units of Government."

D. Hale Brake, State Treasurer, explained "How Michigan now distributes funds to local governmental units."
