Walnut Lake Women's Club Petitions for Bus Service

The first civic project of the recently founded Walnut Lake Women's Club is the securing of bus transportation to Walnut Lake.

Chairman of the project is Mrs. Alice McDougall. Fred G. Lurman, manager of the Birmingham branch of the Greyhound Bus line, said the petition has gone in to the traffic department of the bus company, and that if the petition goes through, two trips a day might be made.

Charley Mortensen, executive secretary of the Chamber of Commerce here, explained that routing a bus out of Walnut Lake would be an extension of the Wing Lake trips. He also explained that the mileage has been measured and that if and when the Greyhound officials consent, the petition would have to go before the Public Service Commission. A temporary license would then be granted and trial runs would be made for a specified period. The question would then go back to the PSC. A line would talk from two weeks to a month to be established.

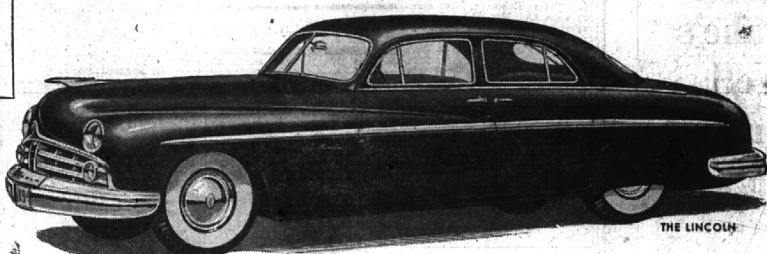

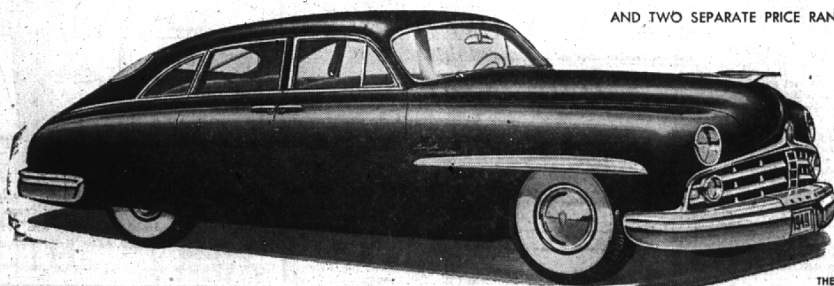
