Beginning May 1st, checking account customers will receive machine-registered receipts for their deposits. Deposit slips will be made out by the customer as heretofore, but

Checking Account Passbooks Will Not Be Needed.

Instead of a pen and ink entry in your passbook, the teller will issue a neat, legible, machine-printed receipt which is an exact transcript of the bank's record. You keep these receipts in a special wallet-like container, furnished by the bank. Each month, after you have checked your regular bank statement, you may discard the receipts or file them with your cancelled checks.

In addition to faster window service and increased protection, this new plan assures much greater privacy. The old fashioned passbook told all the customer's business to anyone who happened to see it. The machine-registered receipt records only the amount of a single deposit. If it is lost, it discloses no personal information to the finder. If a messenger is sent to the bank with a deposit, he will not have access to revealing details of your financial affairs as recorded in a passbook.
