### August Maelbergh Kappa Kappa Gamma to Present Recitals at Christ Church

Beginning Sunday, May 2, at 4:00 p.m. and continuing throughout the season, August Maelbergh, eminent Belgian carillonneur, will present recitals on the carillon at Christ Church Cranbrook.

A composer whose works are known in recognition on Willbergh and abroad, Maelbergh is organist and choirmaster of St. John's Church in Detroit, professor of organ at Marygrove College, conductor of the Madrigal Club, and director of the Nurses' Club at St. Joseph Mercy and Mt. Carmel Mercy hospitals.

He received his training in Ghent, Ostend, and Yverly in his native Belgium, a country known the world over as the center of the art of bell playing. Maelbergh is a citizen of the United States and a Fellow of the American Guild of Organists.

Immediately following the Carillon recital, at 4:30 p.m. in the Church, the service of musical vesper will be held with Lois Chapman, soprano, and member of the Kingswood School, reciting singing: arias from oratorios by Handel and Haydn.

Willby, flutist, and member of the faculty at Brookside School will be heard in two solos for the organ organ by Handel, Philip Malpas will be at the organ. The Rev. Robert W. Anthony will deliver a short meditation.

Next Sunday, May 9, immediately following the carillon recital, George Paxton, eminent brown concert organist from Boston, will be heard in recital in Christ Church Cranbrook at 4:30 p.m.

Formerly a member of the organ faculty at the University of Michigan, Paxton is an accomplished teaching organ at the New England Conservatory and the Longy School of Music, where he is organist and choirmaster at the Church of the Advent, Boston, guest.
