The Y-Teen Leadership Conference is one of the highlights of the year for Detroit's 5,000 Y-Teens, junior members of the YWCA. While only 120 girls can attend the conference they are responsible for bringing back to their clubs the inspiration gained at conference, new ideas for programs, entertainment, worship and service projects.

In addition to intensive training for their jobs as Y-Teen officers, the conference delegates will

enjoy free time each day to play Camp Cavell's 40 acres of sun-dappled woods and meadow, swimming in Lake Huron, playing tennis, badminton, and of course sun-tanning. Singing and folk dancing in the big lodge usually close each day at camp.

Chartered buses will take the Y-Teens from Detroit to Conference. Miss Doris E. White, YWCA staff member in charge of conference, says, "One of the by-products of the Cavell Conference is the better understanding which naturally follows when girls have a chance to live in this intimate camp setting for a week with other girls who come from different backgrounds... nationally, religious, economic and racial."
