Following the ceremony, a wedding breakfast and reception were held at the Kingsley Inn, Bloomfield Hills.

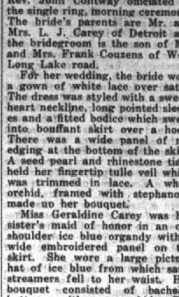
After a wedding trip through Michigan, the couple will be at home in their apartment on Long Lake road.

Cherry or mint for garnish

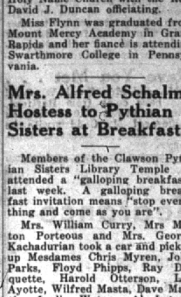

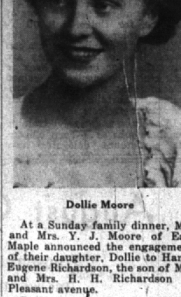
Mrs. Glenn Levey Hostess to NSDAR Club Members
