One of the features of this year's fair, the dates of which are Sept. 3 through Sept. 12, will be the fruit stands which the 4-E Clubs will maintain in the agricultural building. Peas, apples and other seasonal fruits, as well as cider and honey will be offered for sale. Another new feature will be the potato show, also in the agricultural building. H. R. Pettigrove of the Michigan College will direct this show and also the exhibit of small grains.
