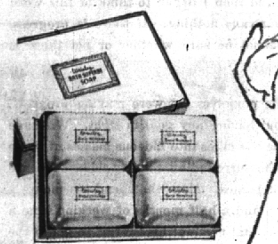
Following a wedding trip to the Pocono Mountains, the young couple will resume their studies at the University of Florida.
