**Two Local Boys Win Awards in Model Contest**

Two youths from Birmingham who displayed unusual talent in designing and building model mobiles were declared winners yesterday in the 1948 Fisher Body Craftsmen's Guild competition.

Tom Goad, 1090 Glenhurst, won top honors in the junior division in the state and received a prize of \$150. His model was then chosen over the best junior model from Ohio to give him the regional honors. As a regional winner, he will receive a four-day free trip to the National Craftsmen's Guild convention in Detroit to be held from Aug. 24-27. At this time Goad's model will compete with 42 other regional winners for one of eight university scholarships which are being offered at grand national awards. Young Goad is the son of C. C. Goad, vice-president and director of General Motors and general manager of the Fisher Body division.

**City Applies for Government Aid for Sewage Plant**

Birmingham should take advantage of the use of federal legislation designed to aid municipalities in controlling water pollution, City Manager Donald C. Egbert told the city commission Monday evening.

Under the provisions of the act, the city could obtain a grant to be used for planning sewage treatment plants, as well as obtain a 2 per cent loan for construction of the plant, Egbert said.

"I have already filed an informal application for this aid, although the machinery hasn't been set up yet," he advised the commission.

Egbert said it had not been determined whether the money for plant construction would be an outright 2 per cent loan, or whether the city would have to issue bonds at 2 per cent which the government would purchase.
