Notice of Application to the Michigan Public Service Commission by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company For Authority to Make Effective Certain Schedules of Rates, Rentals, and Charges in the Birmingham Zone of the Detroit District Exchange

In accordance with statutory requirements, notice is hereby given that an application will be presented by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company to the Michigan Public Service Commission in the City of Lansing on the 15th day of December, 1948, for authority to make effective increased rates, rentals and charges for the furnishing of telephone service and facilities in the exchanges and zones of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in the state of Michigan, as set forth below. The application also will request the Commission to set a date for the hearing of the matter.

Rate increases authorized by the Commission in October were insufficient by a large margin to provide the revenue now needed to assure good telephone service in the future. The authorized increases were based on the financial condition of the Company in the period beginning September 1947 and ending August 1948. The Company's new rates for the Commission consider increases to meet conditions set by cost increases in certain rates and charges as shown in the following table. The Company will not appeal any one for the Commission to have an opportunity to determine that the remaining increases shown in the following tables are reasonable and proper.

PROPOSED INITIAL RATE INCREASES

Pending complete consideration of all the rate changes proposed below, the following initial rate increases are proposed:

- Exchange Rates: Increase the present basic monthly rates for business main telephones 50c. Increase the present basic monthly rates for residence main telephones 25c. Increase the present basic monthly rates for private branch exchange trunk lines 75c.
- Miscellaneous Rates: Increase the present daily guarantee for semi-public coin box service 2c. Increase service connection charges the full amount as proposed below.
- Intrastate Toll Rates: Increase intrastate telephone and teletypewriter message toll rates the full amount as proposed below.

SEMI PUBLIC SERVICE—Present: Guarantee, 25c per day. Charges for messages to telephones in all zones of the Detroit District Exchange and to Aurora Heights and Fenwick. Proposed: Guarantee, 30c per day; and, in addition, a monthly charge of \$3.00. Charges for messages are credited against the guarantee as at present.

\*Temporary local zone rates also are shown in effect, in addition to the present rates shown above, as follows: Business temporary rates, \$5.00 per month, business rural lines, \$3.75 per month, residence temporary rates, \$3.25 per month.

MISCELLANEOUS RATES (Excluding Federal Tax)

INTRASTATE TOLL RATES (Excluding Federal Tax)

Telephone Message Toll Rates: Two-point Connections: Increase most day station-to-station rates 5c to 15c. Increase day person-to-person rates 5c to 30c. Increase night station-to-station rates by reducing the discount on corresponding day station-to-station rates from approximately 35% to 20%. Increase night person-to-person rates by applying discounts on corresponding day person-to-person rates in the same amounts which would be applicable to station-to-station calls. Reduce initial period on 10c station-to-station calls from 5 minutes to 3 minutes and increase the overtime charges from 5c for each 2 minutes to 5c for each 2 minutes. Increase overtime charges 5c for each minute of overtime on most station-to-station and person-to-person calls involving distances of over 45 miles. Conference Connections: Increase initial period rates 10c for the two stations in the connection farthest apart and 10c for each station in the connection over 20 miles.
