KEEPING HOUSE

A LITTLE OF THIS AND THAT: One of our primary interests these days is probably meat—how to save and serve it! When there's some left over but not enough to serve a portion to each member of the family, make a shepherd's pie by combining the leftover meat, potatoes and vegetables in a casserole dish.

Make a crisp topping on the pie by crumbling wheat biscuits over this filling and baking until golden brown. Serve piping hot. . . . Leftover meat, meat loaf, ham or bacon can be added to canned soups to increase the flavor and nutritional value. Here are two luscious and unusual ideas for a ham glaze:

- (1) 1 cup red jelly mixed with 1/2 cup hot water.
- (2) Brown sugar moistened with leftover pickle juice. . . . You can vary your favorite recipe for raisin sauce (served with ham) by adding pieces of canned pineapple, candied cherries, and a dash of ginger.

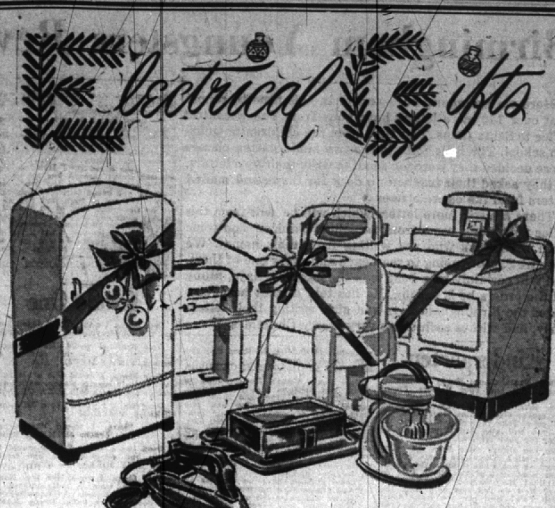
Recipe of the Week: "An egg a day keeps the doctor away"—and this is one of the healthiest, heartiest ways of doing just that:

- 1 tablespoon melted butter
 - 1 egg
 - 1 tablespoon milk
 - dash of salt, pepper, and curry powder
 - 1 tablespoon grated yellow cheese
 - 1/2 paprika
 - 1/2 tablespoon bread crumbs
- Set the oven for 350° F. Melt the butter in an individual baking cup in the oven. Remove the cup and grease the inside with some of the melted butter. Break the egg into the cup, add milk, seasoning, and bread crumbs, then top with grated cheese. Add a dash of paprika for attractive appearance. Bake 15 minutes or

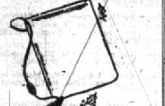
until firm. Serve with tomato paste or ketchup. **FOOD FOR THOUGHT:** The disposition and the thoughts of a woman mold the expression of her face and thus, her beauty. **DID YOU KNOW?** That you should never apply soap directly to the skin. It makes them take on a whitish look. Wash garments in warm, sudsy water to cut dirt and grease. When thoroughly clean, rinse in cold water. . . . You can stretch your food dollar by looking for labels which describe the can or package contents. It's surprising how much helpful information you will obtain from them. . . . For a golden-brown glaze on pie crust, brush the crust, before baking, with either foamy egg whites (slightly beaten), cream, or melted butter. Let it stand for 5 minutes before popping into the oven. . . . If your silver is not too badly scratched, you can remove the scratches by applying a paste made of olive oil and putty powder. Rub the paste gently on the metal with soft cloth, then wash the silver in very hot water and dry immediately.

It isn't necessary to have a master mechanic's knowledge of your car—but you should know in a general way, what those dials on the dashboard mean. Gasoline gauges have individual quirks, and you'd do well to understand yours perfectly. Some gauges consistently show more gasoline than is actually in the tank, others in variously show less. Watch your oil gauge closely. When you fill up at the service station, and compare its reading with the exact amount you know you have in your tank. The oil gauge does not show the amount of oil, but rather the pressure developed by the oil pump. The needle should move slowly to normal immediately after the motor starts. But never race an engine to force the needle, because racing a stiff, old motor will cause damage. If the needle fluctuates or drops to zero—that's a real danger signal. If you are close to a service station, drive slowly to it and let the operator take over. The temperature gauge is your check on the cooling system. The needle should register normal, and a sudden rise in temperature means trouble. In nine out of ten cases, it indicates that the radiator is dry. If so, let the engine cool thoroughly, then add water slowly—with the engine running. Check in at the nearest service station. The ammeter simply shows if the battery is receiving or discharging electricity. For daytime driving the needle should register plus; at night when the battery is running your lights, windshield wiper, heater or radio, it may register minus. A constant minus reading, with no plus indications should be checked. Make a habit of checking your dashboard dials. It can save you trouble and money.
