This first defeat for the Acorns in five years at Birmingham team wasn't brought about by the efforts of just a few, but by the combined effort of the Maple coaching staff and playing squad.

The down payment for this victory was made by Coach Secotine with his long hours of patient work at the practice field. Bob Littleton's pass to Rollie McGinnis for a touchdown in the first quarter was the first of a series of installments; other payments were made by Clayton Joyce, Colin Campbell, Dick Murray, and the rest of the Maple line and backfield. The final installment was made when Bob Littleton dashed 35 yards for another Birmingham touchdown, making the final score 12-0. Receipt for payment came when Coach Secotine walked from the field with the little red, white, and blue jug clutched tightly in his arms.

Last weekend saw the Detroit papers picking the All-State high school teams for Michigan. The Detroit Times placed Captain Clayton Joyce on the second string, and Bob Littleton made honorable mention. The Free Press honorable mention list included Bob Littleton and Dale Pearson despite his injury in the middle of the season.

Only two Birmingham players were placed on the All-Eastern Michigan League team; they were Clayton Joyce, guard, and Bob Littleton, halfback.
