Big Beaver Methodists To Dedicate Church Sunday

On Sunday Dec. 5, at ten o'clock the new Big Beaver Methodist Church will be formally opened at the morning service. Dr. W. E. Harrison, superintendent of the Detroit district of the Methodist Church, will preach the sermon. In the evening at 7:30 a special service will be conducted with the Rev. Arnold Runkel, minister of the First Methodist Church, Birmingham, preaching. The choir, under the direction of Mrs. Henry Hicks, will present special music at all services.

which still continues. On October 24, 1845, the building was destroyed by fire, and since that time church and Sunday school have been held in the high school building.

Submit New Plans
Soon after the church burned plans were submitted by Earl Costers, Detroit architect, for a colonial design edifice, but government restrictions on building prohibited the trustees from building. In March, this year, the trustees sought bids for the work, and finally decided to let the chairman of the building committee, Eric Franzen, assume the responsibility as general contractor, and to proceed with the building as far as finances would allow. The result has exceeded expectations, and instead of having only a basement, the superstructure was erected to the top of which is to be finished as money is available. Fellowship Hall in the basement is completed and ready for use. It will be the meeting place for all activities for a while.

Has Adequate Stage
It will hold three hundred persons, and in addition has an adequate stage, with class rooms on each side. The kitchen, project of the Women's Society of Christian Service, will be adequate and well equipped.

The work to date has cost \$50,000, exclusive of much donated labor. 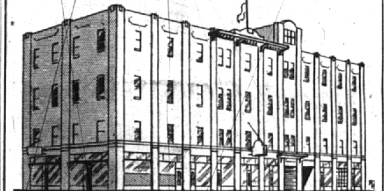
