**Issue of Oct. 21**

Everett J. Farr, formerly supervisor of drivers on the Birmingham division of Great Lakes Greyhound Lines, has been appointed superintendent of the division succeeding Fred G. Uhrman, company officials in Detroit announced this week. Uhrman resigned to become manager of the bus station at Pontiac.

Chauncey G. Eden, mayor, has announced the appointment of Elmer Kephart as acting city manager for the City of Bloomfield Hills. Kephart, who is city clerk, unofficially took over the managerial duties Oct. 1.

Franklin area residents are rallying to the support of the Village of Lakeside department by donating funds to purchase new equipment and provide for expanded facilities.

Arthur W. Wrasby, 320 Henley drive, Monday morning was presented with a joint Army-Navy letter of commendation for his contribution to the nation during the recent war.

Final committee meeting for the annual city Halloween party was held Wednesday. Committee reports were given by the various chairmen. The food committee reported that they had purchased a steer, which weighs 1,011 pounds. In addition to this there are 250 loaves of bread, 25 dozens doughnuts, a dozen large jars of mustard and 120 gallons of cider.

**Issue of Oct. 22**

Governor Sigler will arrive in Birmingham this Saturday morning in his campaign for re-election to the State's chief executive office. According to Dr. John P. Wood, 1131 Lyonhurst, member of the Republican State committee, unless the Governor will arrive in Birmingham at 11 a.m. to speak to the crowd, Pierce street, between Maple and Martin, will be roped off for the Governor's talk, Wood stated.

Russell Moore, founder of the Bloomfield Hills fire department and president of the department, retire from active duty this week-end. Moore celebrated his 60th birthday on Wednesday. Alertness of Patrolman Edwin Russell prevented a possible gas explosion in downtown Birmingham early Saturday morning. Crews with explosive meters, covered the area where the leak was first reported and with a crew from the Consumer Power Company, began spinning sewer systems and basements to allow the concentration of gas to escape. The leak was finally located at Woodward and Ravine where a three or four-inch main had snapped.

**Issue of Nov. 4**

Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation will be observed Sunday, Nov. 7, by local churches in a union service. The special occasion is sponsored by the Birmingham Council of Churches and will be held in the sanctuary of the First Baptist Church.

Birmingham voters went to the polls Tuesday better informed concerning the seven issues they had to decide upon because of the leaflets distributed to nearly every home in the city last Friday by the Birmingham League of Women Voters.

Traditionally Republican, Birmingham voters turned out Tuesday in nearly-record numbers to back GOP candidates in both national and state contests. The local voting on the several constitutional matters also followed the general trend throughout the state.

Overwhelming "Yes" votes were recorded on all but state proposal No. 2 (repeal of the sales tax amendment) which received a lopsided "No" vote in line with pre-election opinion made by state and school officials.

Mrs. Madalyn Bogue escaped serious injuries Monday morning when a truck wheel crashed through the brick wall of the Fox and Hounds Inn, scattering bricks around the room and onto her bed where she was asleep. She was taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac and was released after X-rays showed her head injuries were not serious.

Hiland M. Thayer has been appointed supervisor of West Bloomfield township to fill the vacancy left by the recent resignation of Robert O. Felt. The appointment was approved at the meeting of the township board of supervisors last week.

News 16 mm sound movie projector has been given to the Community House by the Birmingham Lions Club. Club secretary Donald Cummings made the presentation last week to Mrs. Velma Isley, house director.

**Issue of Nov. 11**

Traffic signals were placed in operation Saturday at Lincoln and Woodward by the State Highway Department in a move to reduce hazards in an area which has become Birmingham's worst accident-frequency spot.

Mrs. Jennie Peterson Gordon, 335 Baldwin, died in Harper Hospital, Detroit, Monday afternoon. She had been in poor health for some time.

The Birmingham Rotary Club will observe its 25th anniversary at special ceremonies May 4, 1949, it was announced this week by Oscar Peterson, chairman of the committee making arrangements for the event.

A concerted effort to reduce or eliminate pedestrian traffic hazards near the city's schools is being made by the Birmingham police department. Police Chief Ralph Moxley was given the "go-ahead" sign by city commissioners Monday evening to mark some street corners where there would be less traffic risks at several intersections with school buildings.

New houses under construction here have again fallen prey to vandals, according to police. Six windows were shot out of one home being built at Lakeside and Redding roads. On Chester, considerable damage was done to work which had only shortly been completed on the house.

The Adams school student council has completed its organization for the current semester with 29 members. They took the oath of office at an all-school assembly last week. Major project for the year is the adoption of the Denethose school at Kayenta, Ariz. Situated in the most isolated and unproductive part of the great reservation, the school houses 150 Navaho children.

By unanimous vote the Detroit Presbytery agreed to the resignation of the Rev. Leslie A. Bechtel, executive secretary for the past four years, that he might accept the call as the first regular minister at Kirk in the Hills Church.

**Issue of Nov. 18**

Continuing their safety campaign, Birmingham police have created an experimental traffic zone on Chesterfield at Quanton school. For the next 30 days, no U turns will be permitted in front of the school and traffic will be one-way from Oak to Melbourne. Parents calling at the school for their children or bring them to classes, must enter Chesterfield from Oak and are permitted any turns until reaching Melbourne or Pine.
