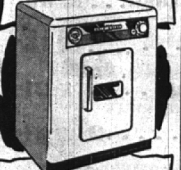

## 3-Game Program Opens City League Basketball Season

In games played last Monday evening at Baldwin high school gymnasium, A's All Stars, W. Close guarding and low scores featured the play in which a total of 57 players participated.

This lead was doubled at half-time before the Virginia Market offense could solve the zone defense of the Telephone basketballers. **Fast Offense**  
A's All Stars displayed a very fast breaking offense combined with a closely knit defense to defeat Exchange-sponsored club by scores of 31 to 20. Harold Kelley broke away repeatedly to make lay-up shots and to score from the floor. His 14 points was high for the evening.

Earl Mudge, Don Little and Al Larsen gave excellent defensive performances and combed to feed the ball to Kelley who was "red-hot." Leo Higginson and Bud John contributed and 5 points to the Exchange cause.

The first quarter score was 6 to 9 in favor of the Stars and this gradually became 20 to 16 at the final period. Kelley's rotary basket spins at this point gave the Stars a commanding lead which they held to the end.

W. A. Caltrider's flashy blue and white team played a nip-and-tuck game with Rotary sponsored club for one half and then gradually pulled away as Roge Reynolds, Earl Mudge, Harold Kelley and Jim Kothe began to garner points. Although the final score was 31 to 20, it was Caltrider's, the Rotary quintet played a better game than the score would indicate and they make a good showing as the season progresses.

In drawing for the Eastern Michigan League invitational basketball tournament, Birmingham found itself pitted against Hamtramck at 5 o'clock on Dec. 16 in the first game of the night in Mt. Clemens.

The teams competing include the six league teams with Van Dyke and Hamtramck. Port Huron meets Ferndale with the winner meeting the victor of the Maples-Hamtramck game. Van Dyke meets Hazel Park with the victors playing the winner of the East Detroit-Mt. Clemens game.

**Strong Team**  
Hamtramck led by six-foot four center Ken Burrell, all-city honorable mention, has four returning lettermen in Hamtramck's defense: Lansing Sexton in the season opener 36-35.

With such stars as Harry Lauder, Jack Christensen and other veterans from last year's team Ferndale promises to be one of the strongest teams in the tourney. Ferndale defeated Ann Arbor 42-26 in the season debut.

Under the direction of Coach Brick Fowler and led by guard Lyle Smith, Port Huron has four returning lettermen. The Blue Water boys defeated Van Dyke 31-23. The latter has ten returning lettermen and didn't lose a man from last year's team.

Mt. Clemens looks to be the strongest of the teams from all pre-season reports. Led by Captain Harry Mylton, the Bathers have ten returning lettermen last season's squad intact. Charles Nemeuth, Bather coach, says "The team looks fair and would round into a good ball club."

Hazel Park has two returning lettermen and was defeated in the season opener by Grax with the 35-31.

## Police Dept. Order Becomes Permanent

Temporarily closed during the school day noon hour on order of the police, Frank street, between Pierce and Purdy will be permanently closed to traffic between 11:55 a.m. and 12:45 p.m. every school day, the city commission decided Tuesday evening.

## Closing of Alley Awaits Reply from Property Owner

City Manager Donald C. Egbert does not recommend the vacation of an alley between Canterbury and Northside, just west of Southfield road, unless the property is restricted to income or single family homes.

If developed according to its present terrace classification, it would require an alley for service to the tenants, Egbert told the city commission.

P. K. Rishheim of Royal Oak, who has petitioned for the closing, has been sent a copy of Egbert's recommendation, and the city will wait a reply from him before taking further action on his request.

It is believed Rishheim might want to have the property rezoned to a higher classification, it was pointed out.

## Movies of Arab World to Be Shown Sunday

New post-war color motion pictures of mysterious "Egypt, Kingdom of the Arab World" will be shown in a World Adventure Series public lecture at 3:30 next Sunday afternoon, Dec. 12, at the Detroit Institute of Arts. Robert Stanton, globe-trotting author from New York, will appear in person with his new color movies.

The pictures show fabulous Cairo, Alexandria and other cities. A trip up the busy Nile to long-dead Memphis and to age-old Pyramids; camel caravans past the Sphinx; and the bazaars, Moslem mosques, and minarets and veiled harem women; water wheels and water buffaloes on desert farms; bathing beauties on the Egyptian Riviera; an Arab movie studio and movie queen.

Feeling against western nations was running high when Stanton filmed these new color pictures. He was arrested many times, and three occasions went to jail. Shortly after his departure from Cairo, Egypt, was closed to documentary film photography. Hence, this is the only existing up-to-date color film of the Arab world.

On petition by the Great Lakes Tractor & Equipment Co., which will begin operations after the first of the year in the Field Detroit Co. buildings, which were recently purchased, the city commission has vacated sewer and water services in the Villa and Yosemite road easements, lying east of the GTR right-of-way.

Since the property at that point is under one ownership and not developed by single homes as originally planned, there is no need for the city to maintain these easements, City Manager Donald C. Egbert recommended to the commission.
