Seven Birmingham boys will compete next Saturday with students from over the country for admission to the Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps program. If this scholastic test is passed, the candidates will later take the rigid naval physical test. If successfully completed, Michigan's quota will be selected. The candidates have to be accepted at one of the 52 NROTC universities.

The NROTC program entitles the candidates to four years of college at one of the many and varieties throughout the country.

At present three Birmingham boys are on NROTC courses. They are Bill Kendry at the University of Michigan; Dick Ealston, Dartmouth and Lee Durham, Duke.
