Speaker at Dinner

Walter P. Nickell, naturalist and photographer at the Cranbrook Institute of Science in Bloomfield Hills, will be the speaker at the Father and Son dinner meeting of the Men's Club of First Methodist Church Tuesday evening, Feb. 24.

Dr. Nickell served two terms as president of the Detroit Audubon Society and has been an instructor in woodcraft in several summer camps throughout the country, including the National Audubon Nature Center at Greenwich, Conn. He is also the new president of the Michigan Association for Native Plant Protection.

His program at the Birmingham Methodist Church will include natural color slides of a number of Michigan's native birds accompanied by imitations of their songs, calls and cries.

Georges Enesco to Give Recital on Detroit Stage

Georges Enesco, internationally famous as a composer, conductor and violinist, will give a recital at the Detroit Institute of Arts Auditorium Tuesday, Feb. 24, under the auspices of the Detroit Tuesday Musicals.

At the age of seven Enesco entered the Vienna Conservatory from which he graduated with high honors and continued his studies at the Paris Conservatory. Born in Romania, Enesco has toured the country many times. His last pre-war visit was in 1939 as guest conductor of the New York Philharmonic Symphony.

Major General Urges U.S. Not to be Easy Target

Major-General Stanley Reinhardt spoke before a meeting of the Birmingham Branch of the American Association of University Men Feb. 11 at the Community House.

The general said, "The security of our country should not be delegated to amateurs than the health of our loved ones to untrained medicine men."

"If we have entrusted our defense to amateurs, it is not the fault of our congressmen but of ourselves who have the final authority," General Reinhardt, speaking from thirty-five years experience, showed the importance of a well-trained army in preventing wars and described the value of military training to individual soldiers.

Help Make Better Citizens
Much of the education received by a boy in the army will help to make him a better citizen. Among the finest things he learns are to get acquainted with boys of other sections of the country and to do what he ought to do at the time he ought to do it," continued the general.

General Reinhardt gave a brief history of the wars the United States had fought to prove his point that a country with a well

prepared army is less vulnerable to aggression. "The woodmen who fought in the Revolution were better prepared than the continental soldiers for the king of fighting required; the American navy with its superior ships and men equipped to pull them made up for the deficiencies of our land army in the War of 1812; after

the Civil War, American troops had only to appear at the Mexican border to enforce the Monroe Doctrine without fighting," he said.

General Reinhardt urged us not to be an easy target.
