Women Voters Discuss CMT at Monday Meeting

The Community House was the scene of a lively discussion on compulsory military training during the morning session of the monthly meeting of the League of Women Voters held Monday, with Mrs. F. G. Garrison, president of the Birmingham League, presiding.

Mrs. Howard Liverance, a director of the League, was chairman of the afternoon meeting. "The Role of Public Opinion in Legislation" was the subject of a talk by Mrs. Stanley Cain. She concluded her remarks with the statement that "public opinion waits on leadership to supply the gist of fact and suggestion so that it can fulfill its function, which is the acceptance or rejection of proposals."

She reminded the members that it was their responsibility as citizens to nominate and elect bold, responsible leaders, to help form alert and intelligent public opinion and to compete with special interest lobbies as a League and as individuals.

Plan Panel Discussion

Mrs. Blair Swartz reviewed current legislation with emphasis on bills of special interest to the League of Women Voters.

Mrs. John Ormond and Mrs. A. J. Steelman drew a verbal picture of the workings of county and state conventions, and discussed how Birmingham women could become active in political parties should they so desire.

After the discussion was closed, Mrs. Garrison announced that the Birmingham League of Women

Voters would present a panel discussion of the European Recovery Plan at a meeting to be held at the library March 2 at 1:30 p. m. Mrs. Garrison will act as moderator and the panel will consist of Mrs. Lee White, Mrs. Frank Smith, Mrs. Herbert Gardner, Jr. and Mrs. Cain.

Mrs. W. L. Bones is in charge of the tea and Mrs. Harold Towne and Mrs. Stanley Patterson will pour.



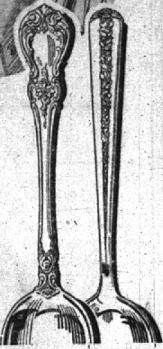

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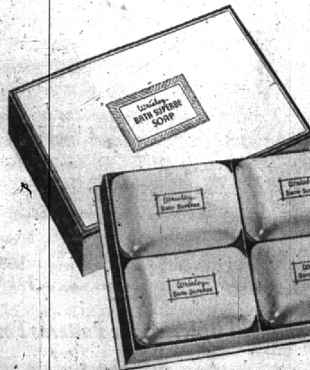


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
