GIRL SCOUTS

International Friendship, fastest growing field of interest in Girl Scouting is being featured by Birmingham Girl Scout troops throughout February. It was announced by Mrs. R. W. Reilly, president of Birmingham Girl Scout Council.

"There are more than two and a half million Girl Guides and Girl Scouts scattered throughout almost all of the civilized countries of the world," Mrs. Reilly said, "and February is international month on every Girl Scout calendar from Arabia to Alaska and from Australia to Sweden."

According to Mrs. Reilly world scouting has grown in spite of war and opposition. In the occupied countries where Guiding and Scouting were banned under the Nazis, membership is twice what it was before the war. Guide and Scout groups are forming now in Korea and in many other countries where there has never been a democratic organization for girls.

The movement is taking root in both Germany and Japan, also.

"As more and more girls join, they take the Promise to 'do my duty to God and my country, to help other people at all times and to obey the Girl Guide or Girl Scout Law,' this promise becomes the first of the bonds between members of the organization all over the world," Mrs. Reilly explained.

"Some of the ways in which the Girl Guides and Girl Scouts carry on their across-the-seas activities include writing of letters to each other; studying each other's languages, history, customs, folk dances and foods; exchanging gifts; meeting at international camps; and carrying on similar projects which they discuss with each other via letter."

According to Mrs. Reilly, the Girl Scouts of Birmingham are eager not only to learn about foreign peoples but also to help them during the current food and clothing shortages. During 1945 they will lend their efforts to the national undertaking to send a million garments to children in Europe and Asia.

They are stepping up their efforts in food conservation and food production so that children of other countries may receive better nourishment.

"Girl Guides and Girl Scouts are daily strengthening their international bonds," Mrs. Reilly added. "They are making real friends among young people of other lands. Their international friendship program is rapidly becoming a force for peace and its effect may be very far-reaching."
