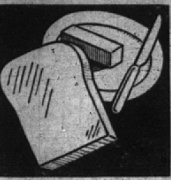


Mat Men Win

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General Reinhart to Speak Before AAUW Group

Major General Stanley Reinhart will talk on the military policy of the United States at the fellowship meeting of the Birmingham branch of American Association of University Women at 1 P.M. Wednesday, Feb. 11, at the Community House.

General Reinhart served in both the Pacific and European theaters of war and was an executive officer of the 24th division artillery at the time of Pearl Harbor; then he served as commander of artillery of the 25th division at Guadalcanal.

He later organized and trained the 65th division of General George Patton's third Army which he took to Europe. He lives with his wife in Birmingham and has a son at West Point.

Cranbrook Concert Honored Memory of Mrs. George Booth

On Monday evening the Detroit Symphony orchestra under the direction of Dr. Karl Krueger presented its annual "Cranbrook Concert" in the Cranbrook School auditorium.

Two of Beethoven's compositions opened the program, "Overture from Coriolanus" and the Allegretto from Symphony No. 7, which was dedicated to the memory of Mrs. George G. Booth. One of the most perfect examples of symphonic art was next heard, the Symphony in G Minor, considered the epitome of Mozart's art.

During intermission, Dr. Robert T. Hart, Director of the Cranbrook Institute of Science, introduced Dr. Krueger, who spoke briefly, urging a greater alliance with art.

The stirring "Stars and Stripes Forever" by Sousa, was given as an encore.
