**Rev. John Snook Succumbs at 73**

Death ended the career of Rev. John Henry Snook, 73, Friday, Jan. 30, at his home, 570 Aspen avenue.

Mr. Snook had devoted years to the social agencies including the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and the Detroit Associated Charities. He was also secretary of the University of Michigan YMCA from 1927 to 1930 and district supervisor of the Michigan State Welfare department.

A graduate of the University of Michigan in 1901, he was graduated from the Union Theological seminary in 1904. During World War I he was a member of the Army and Navy Department commission at Houston, Tex. He was a life member of the Rochester Music lodge and the Delta Tau Delta.
