### Newspaperwoman Presents Talk to University Women

"Women's clubs are valuable to the individual and to the community," Miss Laurea Pringle told members of the Birmingham branch of the Association of University Women at a luncheon meeting, January 14, at the Community House.

Miss Pringle, who is the women's editor of a Detroit newspaper and author of a daily column introduced the subject of the value of women's clubs and encouraged a lively discussion from the members. She said "women's clubs are like women's hats — everyone laughs at them, but no one takes them." "Their influence may be greater," she said, "if women become less self-conscious." She emphasized that clubs which are part of larger organizations should be aware of their institutional activities and should disseminate their ideas among non-members.

Hyperactivity within an organization may not be a bad sign since it shows growth, was among her interesting remarks. Women who pride themselves on not belonging to pressure groups are misled, since any group which hopes to accomplish anything of value becomes a pressure group.

In comparing women's clubs to men's clubs a suggestion was made that men's clubs have larger dues and more money for their activities.
