Although the Maples were guilty of erratic passing in the early stages of the game, they controlled the backboards for the entire contest to stop the Vikings' long-shooting attack.

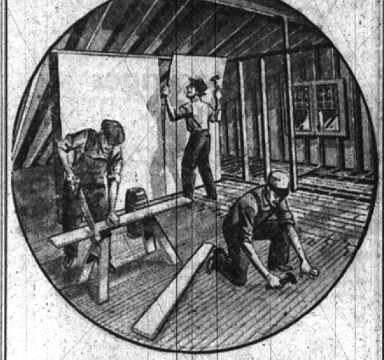
