Noted Psychiatrist Will Speak Before Woman's Club

 The speaker will be Dr. Claude Uhler, director of the Clinton Valley Child Guidance Clinic serving Oakland and Macomb Counties, who will speak on "The Normal Mind and its Perils," developing the thought that our ability to make efficient social and vocational adaptations is dependent upon the normal mind which contains the ideal for the state of culture in which we live. Each generation has its own idea of normality. As values change a climax is brought upon the personality.

Outstanding Performance Given by Lock and Turner

A capacity audience applauded the artistry of the two young men, who gave a joint recital at the Community House Monday evening.
 Charles Ross Turner, violinist, and Stanley Lock pianist, were in fine form for the Birmingham Musicale.
 The programme covered a wide range of interesting material. First was the Respighi arrangement of the classic Vivaldi sonata, and in contrast the melodious line of the Beethoven "Spring" sonata which followed. These two numbers gave the audience an excellent opportunity to enjoy the ensemble and interplay of the instruments.
 Following the intermission, Stanley Lock presented a group of five solos, two Bachmannoff preludes in typical Bachmannoff style, followed by the romantic

"Maiden and the Nightingale" by Granados, "Nigun" by Bloch, which the subtle A flat waltz of Chopin and the B flat minor Scherzo, brought the group to a close. For a distinctly modern accent, he added an encore, the "Improvisation" by Poulenc.
 The haunting sombre Hebrew lament, "Nigun" by Bloch, which Charles Turner played with fine regard for the musical content, opened the violin group. This was followed by the typically Spanish fandango Malaguena by Sarasata with the solo line of the violin singing above the rhythmic pattern of the accompaniment.
 The Heifetz arrangement of the satiric March from "Love of the Three Oranges" by Prokofief was the third number of this group. Kreisler's familiar "La Gitana" was the encore.
