Raise Prices of Basketball Tickets

The high school athletic board of control met recently to discuss admission prices for basketball games.

The following changes were made: Student tickets for individual games are 50 cents (if a season book is purchased, the price per game is 25 cents). General admission has been raised from 50 cents to 74 cents.

The price of reserved seat books has been lowered to one dollar per game. The price for students of elementary age remains at 20 cents.

These price adjustments were necessitated by the excessive price rise in equipment costs, the expansion of the athletic program, and improvements in athletic facilities.

All varsity athletics in Birmingham are self-supporting and must be paid for from football and basketball gate receipts.
