

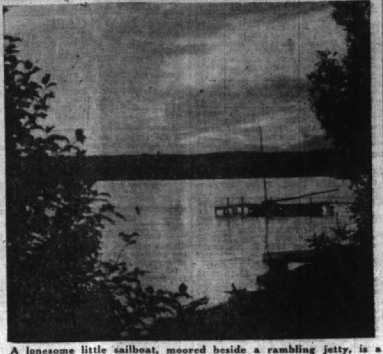
Lower Peninsula of Michigan Is One of Nation's Greatest Vacation Spots

The so-called Lower Peninsula of Michigan is one of the country's greatest vacation playgrounds, and little wonder that hundreds of thousands of beauty-loving visitors from the 48 states troop in to enjoy its green forests, its excellent fishing—and, above all, its glorious summer climate.

Climate—par-excellence, for Michigan's expanses are air-conditioned with water-washed breezes, breezes perfumed by the pine and cedar, and with all the exhilaration of rare old wine. The lower peninsula of Michigan lies like a great hand, Saginaw Bay cutting in on the eastern coast to form the Thumb, and the Leelanau Peninsula representing the little finger.

Has Everything You Want Here is everything the beauty-lover and vacationist might want in natural beauty and the advantages that go with the perfect play-place . . . the deep green of forest and the unforgettable blue of thousands of lakes . . . miles of white beaches and tumbling rivers in which trout gambol . . . picturesque little bays reminiscent of the Gaspe Peninsula and areas of fruit orchards as productive as anything in the Yakima country . . . cool retreats deep in the pines. In this story we shall treat only that area extending northward from an imaginary line drawn east-west from Bay City to Muskegon . . . the area spreading in its blue-green-white splendor from almost the center of the Lower Peninsula to the Straits of Mackinac at Mackinaw City.

It's God's country for the vacationist; summer or winter, for in the cold months that entire area gives us for winter sports and elaborate carnivals, but it is in summer that the country really takes down its hair and plays wholeheartedly. And it is in summer, of course, that the millions of tourists pour in for their days of delight on the water and in the woods, with rod and camera, in lazy hours beside blue lakes and in evenings beneath a silver moon hanging so low you feel you can reach out and touch it. It would be a bootless task even to attempt to parade a detailed

Leaf itself, where the Indians believed that the Great Spirit was fed by the bees . . . Old Fort Mackinac, overlooking the harbor, built by the British in 1780 and restored to its original condition. Skull Cave, where Alexander Henry, one of the few survivors of the massacre, was fed by his adopted brother, famous Chief Wawatam . . . the John Jacob Astor trading post . . . the old cemetery in which also sleep those identified with the early days on the island . . . the monument to Jean Nicolet . . . on and on and on until you find it hard to believe that you actually are seeing such spots in this modern world of ours.

Swing southward and go into Petoskey on Little Traverse Bay, westward at Levering and go into Cross Village, an almost wholly Indian town, and follow the magnificent scenic highway along the bluffs high over Lake Michigan. This drive from Cross Village and into Harbor Springs is, to my way of thinking, one of the most beautiful drives in all of Michigan. If you're interested in Indians . . . and who isn't? . . . you'll find them all along this stretch of country. Around Petoskey descendants of Chief Pe-tos-e-gah still till the soil, and throughout the area there are colorful individuals who might

Pleasures Galore We jump over to Cadillac for a few hours in the William Mitchell State Park on Lake Mitchell and for an hour or so around Lake Cadillac itself. Just east of Cadillac are Lake Michigan and a dozen surrounding lakes and, of course, Lake City State Park. It's hot fun and you are in the center of a great playplace. There are Houghton Lake and Higgins Lake, both expanses of blue water in which the summer vacationist finds pleasures galore. There are fishing and boating and lazy hours along sandy beaches. There are Houghton Lake State Forest and Huron National Forest and Higgins Lake State Forest if you like spreading woodlands.

Then, all of Michigan is a playground . . . a land of lakes and beaches and forest . . . an air-conditioned land whose breezes are washed as they pass over the surrounding open waters . . . a country where the climate is delightful winter and summer and where the home folk are hospitable . . . the very heart's desire of the man or woman who seeks peace and beauty to heal nerves frayed by the roar of urban life. So . . . give you the Lower Peninsula of Michigan.
