The Market boys didn't waste any time going to work on Phil Taylor, starting hater, gathering four runs in the first on three hits, a couple of walks and an error. Paul Taylor's double with the bases loaded was the big blow, driving in three runs.

Local Girl Leaves on Trip to Geneva

WINDSOR LOCKS, Conn.—

Among passengers departing this week from Bradley Field on a Transocean Air Lines DC-4, with Geneva, Switzerland, as a destination point, was Helen Babcock, 315 Fairfax road, Birmingham. She is one of more than 700 Americans flying to Europe this summer as part of a travel program being sponsored by Youth Agency, Inc., a member of the International Youth Hostel Federation.

Members of the hostel parties, who range in age from 17 to 25, will travel in groups of ten once air transit is completed, with an older leader providing supervision. Most of the hostlers are students and many are planning to attend summer schools at universities in Norway, Holland and France. Other groups will assist in the restoration of hostels destroyed in World War II.

Transocean Air Lines, a contract carrier, has undertaken the largest youth air travel program in the annals of World aviation. Flights are departing from Bradley Field three times each week, with return schedules 60 days later for each Youth Agency group. Each flight is carrying approximately 46 passengers.
