

Localities Named to the Oakland Citizens League

Methods whereby county and local government can be improved will be studied by the Oakland Citizens League as a major project for this year, officials of the organization announced today.

A preliminary study of the Reed report, made more than ten years ago by Prof. Thomas H. Reed of the University of Michigan on organization of Oakland County government will be made. Based on the study a course of action will be developed in an effort to initiate certain recommendations made in the report. Simplification of government and more efficient organization may provide a greater return on every tax dollar spent, League officials said.

A series of meetings is being

planned at which county officials will be invited to explain functions of county government. The possibility of reduction in the size of the board of supervisors is to be studied, plus measures which would have to be approved by the state legislature before radical county changes could be made.

William F. Kalwitz, Pontiac, has been elected president of the Oakland Citizens League for the third time. William W. Donatison of Pontiac and Robert G. Silbar of Birmingham were elected vice-presidents of the organization. Henry S. Booth of Bloomfield Hills was re-elected secretary and Russell A. McBride, Birmingham, was re-named treasurer.

In memory of Dr. S. S. Marquis, former rector of Christ Church, Cranbrook, a memorial gift of \$500 to support activities of the Citizens League was made by Mr. Booth. Dr. Marquis was instrumental in organization of the Citizens League 10 years ago.

City Gets Right Just in Case—

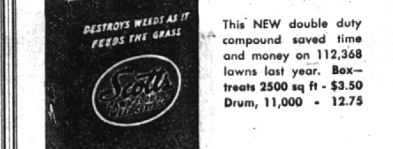
