## Christian Science Lesson-Sermon for Sunday, July 18

"Life" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Christian Science churches throughout the world on Sunday, July 18.

The Golden Text (John 5:26) is: "As the Father hath life in himself; so hath he given to the Son to have life in himself."

Among the Bible citations in this passage (Psalms 43:12-14): "What man is he that desireth life, and loveth many days, that he may see good? Keep thy tongue from evil, and thy lips from speaking guile. Depart from evil, and do good; seek peace, and pursue it."

Correlative passages to be read from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy, include the following (p. 24): "Life is eternal. We should find this out, and begin the demonstration thereof. Life and goodness are immortal. Let us then shape our views of existence into loveliness, freshness, and continuity, rather than into age and blight."
