Store Meat Fats Properly Before Turning Them In

A little forethought saves you much precious time when it comes to the fat salvage campaign being waged by the American Fat Salvage Commission. The fat and drippings are still needed, so continue to have all those you don't use yourself and turn them into your market man.

However, take heed of the regulations. If the fat is turned in, for if yours is accepted it will help relieve your grocery bill, and it will seem as though the fat in the first place, much less carry it to the market, if it is not so stored.

So store the fat, covered, in a metal container, in the refrigerator or present. Sanitary markets will not accept fats in glass jars because of the risk involved, so it pays to start your fat salvage campaign in the proper container so that you don't have to transfer it.
