SAUGATUCK—Here on Michigan's West Dutch coast, just 12 miles south of tulip-famous Holland, is the artist summer capital of the Middle West.

As you approach the village by automobile on US-31, an illuminated sign welcomes you. It displays an artist's pallet, bright with colors.

Landscape paintings are on display at village shops. At the Saugatuck Village Hall, whose architectural lines remind you of New England, you are invited to view an exhibit of paintings 2 to 5 p.m. daily. An artists' ball is held in August.

And yet, apparent as it is that Saugatuck is proud of its artists, the artists themselves are not all happy about Saugatuck's growing prosperity as a summer recreational center.

Garish, electric signs tempt tourists to imbibe at cocktail bars. The blare of orchestra music is in the air. Sale of liquor is abnormally brisk at Saugatuck and Douglas. Like the phenomenon noted by protesting ministers at Rose City, popular first stop for northbound hunters and fishermen, Saugatuck is a satisfactory place for city people to relax and unwind.

Vacationers, some of whom arrive in luxurious cruisers, are inclined to imbibe freely. The artists' atmosphere of Bohemian in-
