A personal visit to St. Malo, France, to see how his citizens are benefiting from the financial support of several Birmingham groups and organizations will be one of the objectives of Leon de St. Nicolas, local 6-8, 7-5. Daily.

De St. Nicolas, his wife and 10-year-old son, John, leave by plane for France Saturday afternoon for a month's visit to France and Switzerland. Principal reason for his trip is to visit relatives in Paris and Montebourg, Normandy, a little village near the site of the American "D-Day" landing during the war.

Leon originally came to the U. S. in 1929, returning to France in 1934 for a visit. During and since the war, he has sent a total of more than 400 packages of food, clothing and other articles to residents of Montebourg as gifts of himself or his Birmingham friends.

Delay Action on New Field House; Bid Is Too High

Since the lowest bid on the construction of a 48 by 80-foot cinder block field house at Pierce Field exceeded the school board's estimate by about \$17,000, the board at a special meeting last Thursday turned the bid down and have delayed action on the structure.

Superintendent Dwight B. Ireland stated that while the building number of unpleasant conditions which result through present use of Pierce school as a locker room and for storage of sports equipment, the board is in no position to meet this portion of the bid which is in excess of the estimate.

Ultimate plans call for a field house which will include two locker rooms, public comfort stations, an equipment drying room, and storage room.
