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The League of Women Voters to Interview Primary Candidates

Candidates for state and federal offices will be interviewed during the next few weeks by the Birmingham League of Women Voters in preparation for their election bulletin which is to be issued prior to the August 14 primary. The candidates are scheduled to be questioned this week on their platforms and opinions on leading questions. They are Edgar F. Down of Pleasant Ridge, (Rep.) incumbent state senator, 15th district; George N. Higgins, Ferndale, Republican candidate for state senator, 13th district; Marvin Kuschnick, Birmingham, Republican candidate for state representative, third district, who is running against the incumbent, Howard R. Estes of Birmingham; and F. Pontiac, Democratic candidate for the 17th Congressional district.

Continuing the interviews next week, the Democratic candidates for state senator, third district, will be questioned. They are Fred J. Winstanley of Millard, Joseph J. Fournier of Keego Harbor and Fred Wilkinson of Farmington.

F. G. Garrison, president, and Mrs. Stanley Cain of Birmingham will head a committee to conduct the interviews. The meetings are open to the general public.

The Birmingham League of Women Voters cooperating with the Detroit League of Women Voters as well as three Oakland County Leagues, Pontiac, Inter-Lake and Royal Oak, to obtain information on all the candidates in the primary election. Data gathered will be used to inform members and the general public of the qualifications and beliefs of all candidates.
