**Wild Throw**

Ferns stole second, and Borgeau reached first on an error at short, loading the bases. All runners moved up on a passed ball. Eade then drove in the last two runs with a single to center. Miller struck and Hoover grounded to short, forcing Eade.

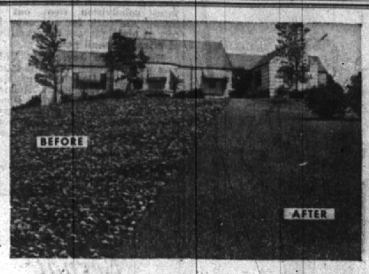

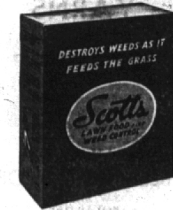
## Former Resident to Marry in East

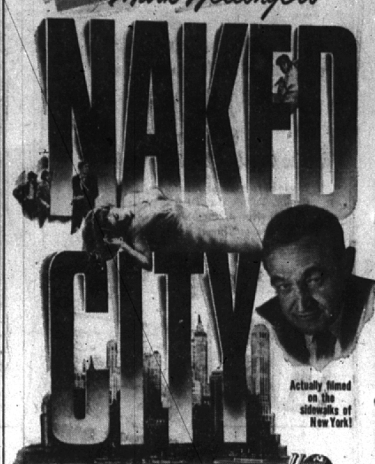
