AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 248

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 248 OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN, RELATIVE TO ENTITLED LICENSING AND REGULATING THE BUSINESS OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND BICYCLES

The City of Birmingham Ordinance No. 248 of Ordinance No. 248 of the City of Birmingham, being an Ordinance Relating to Licensing and Regulating the Business of Motor Vehicles and Bicycles, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2—Application for License.
Any person desiring to procure a license hereunder shall file with the City Clerk an application, in writing, which said application shall set forth the name and address of the applicant, the place within the City of Birmingham at which the proposed license is to be located, the type of vehicle, whether motor vehicle or bicycle, to be licensed, and the number of each, which number shall be the maximum number of such vehicles available at any one time, the name and address of the registered owner of such vehicle, if different from the name of the applicant; said person shall, if motor vehicles are to be licensed, file with the City Clerk a certificate or other satisfactory evidence showing that all such motor vehicles are or will be properly licensed or licensed upon the public highways, covered by public liability insurance in a minimum amount of \$1,000.00, for each vehicle, covering damage done by such vehicle; motor vehicles to be licensed shall be accompanied by a fee of \$5.00 where bicycles shall be \$1.00.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately after the passage and upon publication thereof.
