### Varied Activities

Activities include a trip to Greenfield Village and the Thomas Edison Institute; horseback riding and instruction; hikes to Cranbrook; three visits to Biges Stadium; the Detroit Tigers play; bike hikes and swims to nearby lakes; a trip to the Yellow Coach Division of Pontiac Motors; a visit to the Detroit Zoo; a visit to the Ford River Rouge plant; appearance on WWJ's "Midside Stuff" radio program; a tour through a gingerale factory; an all-day trip and picnic to Bob-Lo; and special features to be announced from time to time.

The program of those who will attend is to be carried out in and near Birmingham, and is designed to meet the needs for directed and supervised activity in events that appeal to the imaginative youngsters. The title is just a pseudonym and will be used only to identify the group.
