Summer Institute to Offer Special Course in Rifery

The Kingswood-Cranbrook Summer Institute is again offering this year its program of recreation and instruction for children and adults.

HOW TO Care For Your Dog

EXERCISE
 The question of exercise is influenced by factors such as breed, age, location and sanitary laws. In cities and towns it is practically impossible to give the larger breeds adequate exercise if the animal must be walked on the leash because of city dwelling. The smaller or medium-sized breeds will generally do well under the adverse conditions of city dwelling. If the owner is scrupulous enough to walk these animals daily, they will generally get enough exercise to keep them in good shape.

Smaller breeds can derive much benefit from such exercise as chasing and retrieving a ball even indoors. The larger breeds of course will need a larger area for such play.

All dogs should be exercised on a leash and where the sanitary code of the locality requires muzzling, the animal should be muzzled.

Puppies can be broken to the leash in a comparatively short time. First, put the collar on and allow them to wear it for a few days. Then add the leash and first allow the animal to run around trailing the leash along. Next, hold the leash and only allow the pup to run the length of the leash.

Finally, walk along, leash in hand, and with a little coaxing and patience you will find that the pup will follow easily.

Occasionally a dog will refuse to lead and the use of a choke or running nose collar will soon cure the pup of the pulling habit.

All dogs love exercise and fresh air and sunshine. So that your dog gets plenty of it.
