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man mother who had lost three sons had said to him, "Tell me, do they have this time? For I have paid enough."

He also said "This memorial will stand for what our flag stands for, for your voice and mine in our government, for those both dead and alive. It is difficult to die for freedom but it is more difficult to live for it. What we are doing this morning is proof that we are interested, that our sacrifices have not been in vain, that my God and your God is not dead."

Young Carol Ann Bingham, wearing a single rose on her light pink dress, pulled the curtain and unveiled the clock.

Mrs. G. W. Mack, in presenting the clock to the Community House to Birmingham, said, "We are saddened at the great sacrifices made, but we should also take courage from them. We must share both pain and victory."

"We are proud to have it in this House," Mrs. Howard Liverance said, accepting the memorial. "We shall always be reminded now that many of our young people who once shared this building with us, were willing to give so much."

Rev. James J. Kress of Holy Name Church, in closing the presentation ceremonies with a prayer, spoke for the gathering.

"We stand before you to dedicate this memorial to those who marched away to defend democracy. They should be remembered because it will mark off in time the lives of those who served so well for us, and may we shall enter into a land where there is no such conflict and no more need for men to die."

An added note to the solemnity of the presentation was the fact that Monday was the birthday of Carol Ann's deceased father.
