Tree Removals OK'd

A request by the Detroit Edison Co. to remove the crabapple trees blocking the entrance to a driveway at 1455 N. Woodward was approved by the city commission Monday evening.

The national forests of the north central region have an abundance of wild fowl and game. Woodcock are common throughout most of the region. Canadian spruce grouse are present in the Minnesota forests and are seen rarely in the Wisconsin and Upper Michigan forests. In the northern forest, snowshoe hares are common or abundant depending upon the stage of the population cycle. Cottontail rabbits are numerous in Lower Michigan.
