St. Dunstan's Is Planning Annual Summer Release

The year 1918 marked the formal opening of the beautiful Cranbrook Greek Theatre, Bloomfield Hills. For two decades this exquisite little theatre with its columns and pool, and surrounded by its curved green hedges, has been the setting for many distinguished dramatic productions.

As has been the custom for years, St. Dunstan's Guild of Cranbrook will offer its final presentation of the season here. Four performances of the witty comedy, "Jacobowsky and the Colonel" will be given on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings, June 17, 18, 19, and 20, 8 p.m. This is the S. N. Behrman adaptation of Franz Werfel's great play, which won the Drama Critics' prize in 1944.

This comedy will play not only for the delight of its audience but will serve to benefit the city of Birmingham's rehabilitation project for the village of St. Malo, France. A substantial percentage of each evening's proceeds will be turned over to this project.

Bombardment and invading troops all but completely razed this town to the ground. We are told that the church there has been painstakingly rebuilt out of packing boxes. Birmingham's many organizations, backed by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, are endeavoring to send food, clothing, and tools of industry to this stricken area. The French Line has guaranteed safe shipment of this cargo to France.

Business manager for this large production is Avon L. Newcomb. Rather intricate sound effects are being engineered by Winston T. Kellogg. Sets will be executed by the architect, Murdo Morrison, and Mrs. Morrison.

Costumes, make-up, and properties will be headed by Mrs. Thomas Sheehan, Mrs. Donald Sanderson, and Mrs. E. J. Anderson respectively. Heading tickets, program and publicity are Mrs. Mair Lind, Miss Nellie Beveridge and Mrs. Benjamin Brewster, respectively.

John W. Blanchard is in charge of theatre maintenance, and Harvey E. Croze, photography, assistant director and stage manager, is Mrs. Lewis C. Keenan, who will be assisted by Miss Alice Sperry.

Director for this production is Jervis M. McMechan. Mr. McMechan will leave shortly for Brynmawr, Pa., for a six weeks' season of theatre work.

Playgoers indeed have an unusual opportunity to enjoy an outstanding comedy at the same time helping to benefit the St. Malo project.
