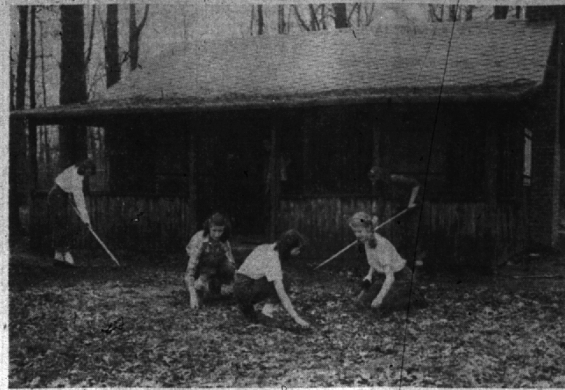

Getting Ready at Springdale Park

Birmingham's 500 Girl Scouts will stage their traditional Penny Drive Saturday, June 5, with the enthusiastic expectation of realizing a "mile of pennies". The purpose is the maintenance of the Girl Scout Cabin at Springdale Park which is pictured above. In the event of rain, the Penny Drive will be held Saturday, June 12.

Pennies contributed by passing shoppers are placed on tapes at the sidewalk edge. The tapes run four ways from the intersection of Woodward and Maple. On the northwest corner the penny tapes will extend from Mulholland's to the Wabek Building; on the southwest corner from McBride's Hardware store to Shain's Drug store; on the northeast corner from Birmingham National Bank to Milley's Shoe store; and on the

southeast corner from Cunningham's Drug store to the White Tower. There will also be tapes in front of the Kroger and A & P Markets.

Headquarters for scout adult leaders assisting with the drive will be in front of Kay Baum Shop, where change may be made, information given and all reports of proceeds turned in. This unique drive is the Birmingham Girl Scout's one big annual event. It is anticipated by all intermediates and reward all donors with a thank you scout smile. Mothers of scouts will also patrol the tapes from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. and assist the girls.

In addition to planning the Penny Drive, Birmingham Girl Scouts have been busy with troop and council activities. Scouts and their fathers gathered at the Community House for their first Pop 'n' Banquet Wednesday night, May 26.

Mrs. Paul McDonald was general chairman and the 240 girls and their dads who attended were highly entertained all evening. They voted Mrs. McDonald a thank-you for this well-planned first father and daughter get-together. Peggy deBaubien welcomed the Scouts, their fathers, and members of the Birmingham Girl Scout Council, who were guests.

Songs were led by Barbara Spangenberg accompanied by Helen Kohler. Then square dances, Dig for the Oyster, Texas Star, Virginia Reel were called by Mel Davey and everyone joined in. A broom dance was an innovation and featured old fashioned waltzes and other ball room dances. Sylvia Chalk gave the farewell and the evening closed with taps.

Brownie Enrollments Held
