BRIDGE AT THE COMMUNITY HOUSE

(A report on the duplicate bridge tournament held at the Community House on Wednesday night.)

The tournament of May 26 brought to light "the distinction of the undistinguished." (This exquisite expression is from the pen of the late great Methodist preacher, Herton S. Rice). Because it was one of those evenings when many of the serious bridge players tied themselves in knots defixing each other. And, as a consequence, little Mrs. Georgia Goulette and her daughter, Rhia Skiffington (who play bridge "just for fun"), took home the second prize in the North and South division.

Mrs. Malcolm Dugles and Mrs. Fletcher Renton won the North and South match of this 10-table game, with Hank Georgia and Jim Gray lamentably third. The East and West players were led by Connie Sills and Evelyn Kysor. Chuck Thumser and Gull Rothfus were second, and Myrtle Rammel and Florence Kraus third.

"Now that's one board you played the spots off of," Ted Nellis, my partner, said to me during a recent game. "I agree with your partner," I beamed back, reaching for the preener to preen a few feathers. Here is the board:

NORTH
S—10
H—K Q 9 6 3
D—A 10
C—K 8 7 6 5

EAST
S—Q 4
H—A J 5 2
D—K Q 8 7
C—10 9 4 3

The auction: North, one heart; South, two diamonds; West, two spades; East, two no-trump; South three clubs; West, three clubs; East and West, pass; North, four clubs; East and West, pass; South, five clubs; East starting an echo with the queen. West then switched to the heart four and dummy's queen and East's ace fell to the deuce of trump in the South hand. The heart king was now established.

(Duck soup. Draw trump; ruff out one spade; ditch the other spade on the heart king; lose one or even two diamonds, if necessary to establish suit; and spread the hand.) South laid down the ace of trumps. ♠♣♦♥♠♣♦♥♠—West was blank! (Now what? The diamond suit was useless. All trumps must be drawn in order to use it, which would kill off the only entries in

the south hand. So—an "end play" was the only chance.) South led a small diamond to the ace. West played the king. The heart king carded from the south hand. Then the diamond ten was led. East took the trick with the queen and led a heart. South ruffed with the club jack and led the spade jack. West covered and dummy ruffed. At trick nine, a heart was led from dummy and ruffed with South's last trump, leaving this situation:

NORTH
H—9
C—K 8 7
WEST S—9 8 6 3
D—9

EAST
D—9
C—10 9 4

SOUTH
D—J 6 5 4

South led the diamond jack, discarding dummy's heart. Then the diamond six was played and ruffed with the club seven. East over-ruffed with the club nine and was forced to lead away from his hand. He ruff up to dummy's king-eight.
