Girl Scout Council Stages Annual Juliette Low Tea; Prepare for Scout Rally

The annual Juliette Low Tea, the chairmanship of Mrs. E. J. Barney of the Birmingham Girl Scout Council, was held last Friday in the Mary Griffith Lounge at the Community House, and was attended by fifty Girl Scouts, the official Juliette Low representatives of each troop in the Council.

Mrs. Robert Spangenberg was some leader of the occasion and Mrs. Barney explained the purpose of the Juliette Low Fund. "Juliette Gordon Low was 52 years old, almost stone deaf and a widow when she founded the Girl Scout movement in the United States," stated Mrs. Barney. A socialite in England until the death of her husband, Mrs. Low returned in 1912 to her native Savannah, Georgia, and organized the first Girl Scout troop there March 12, 1912.

A full-time, life-long interest of Mrs. Low's was world friendship among girls, and the Juliette Low Fund being collected at this time in each troop is used to maintain international camps, the most famous being the Chautau in Switzerland, which is now used as a post-war rest camp. In recent years the Juliette Low Fund has been used for the purchase and distribution of powdered milk and eggs, soft white blankets, play kits for Greek children, a soup kitchen in London, a jeep to carry isolated Greek Scout leaders to meetings, in Korea, a typewriter and mimeograph, and to partially defray expenses of European Scouts or Guides attending international camps like Camp Edith Macy situated in the wooded hills of Westchester County, not far from Pleasantville, N. Y.

Mrs. Carl Rice instructed the Juliette Low representatives how their troop contributions are to be presented at the annual Girl Scout Rally March 19th, and Mrs. S. T. Crisgreen played a record made by a Scout troop in Tucson, Ariz., depicting the formation of the first troop in the United States. Eight little girls formed the first troop in 1912, and the Girl Scout movement today has more than a million and a quarter members.

Mrs. Carl Essery and Mrs. Barney visited each troop and invited their two representatives to attend the annual Juliette Low Tea, and Mrs. Barney states they were delighted with the girls' response. Following the program, punch and assorted doughnuts were served in the Ruth Shain room, where yellow candles and ion-quila set a spring-like motif. Mrs. Fraser Pomeroy and Mrs. Gordon Davis, troop committee members, assisted Mrs. Barney.
