This notice is published in accordance with Chapter 1, Section 3, of the Charter of the City of Birmingham, and Resolution No. 122.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Commission shall meet Monday, March 22, 1948, at the Commission Room in the Municipal Building in the City of Birmingham for the purpose of hearing any objections to the vacating and abolishing of said street.
