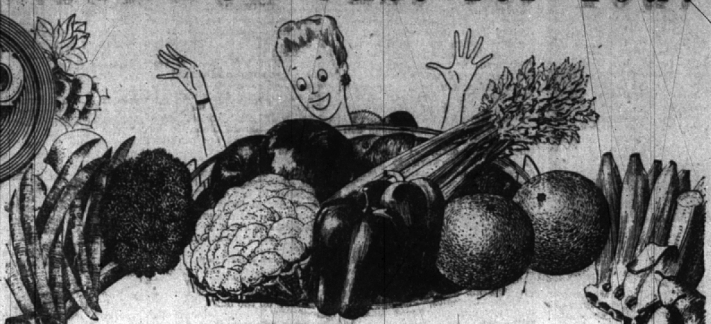

## Don't Let This Throw You, But Lots of Potters Throw Pots at Community House

(This is the third in a series of articles by Mrs. White in which she explains the activities carried on at the Community House, its operation and administration.)

Did you ever think to throw a pot?

Who hasn't? That's what they do in ceramics classes, and modest Mrs. John Foster, the professional who teaches pot throwing in the Community House craft shop, thinks that the attractive phrase, coupled with a continuing interest in mud pies which most of us carry over from infancy, accounts for some of the heavy enrollment in her classes.

The clay kneaders are among the most persistent pupils in the adult education classes which the Community House inaugurated two years ago in response to many requests. One of the problems of the ceramics section of the program is to make room for newcomers in the course, for once they have got the feel of the right consistency of potter's clay, and the rhythm of the potter's wheel, the ceramists can't let it alone.

Here Day and Night! And, as there is a limited number of potter's wheels in the community, the single wheel at the Community House hums day and night and sometimes there is a line-up of eager artists waiting their turn to shape moist earth into ash trays, jugs, vases, plates and plaques—all "pots" in the language of the craft.

Traffic is heavy, too, at the small electric kiln where the ceramic creations are fired on the premises.

Examples of pottery art will be displayed at a one-day craft show at the Community House on March 25, along with objects from the silver jewelry workshop, hooked rugs and paintings made in Community House classes. Also on view then will be clothing and millinery. The designers who made them will wear their own creations. And slip covers made by Community House craft students will also be on display.

Open from 3-5 and 7-10 will contain work of beginners and advanced students, both men and women. Bridge class students will serve tea in the afternoon.

Perfect Attendance. Scouts Burns, Bachman, Glenn Emery, Richard Emery and Cullen Grant will receive special recognition for perfect attendance during the past year.

Chairman Kinnison states that intermingling with the various advancement award presentations will be clarinet, piano and accordion solos by Scouts Jerry Mills, Richard Emery, Peter Plumstead, Richard Staunton and Glenn Emery.

Committee Robert Dudley will tell parents about the Troop's plans for summer camp and the many opportunities the Troop's outdoor program offers the Scouts to make real progress in the "Adventure Trail" project to be inaugurated by Detroit Area Council April 1st. This project will continue throughout the year and have its climax in the annual Scout Exposition to be presented in December.

adult education program of the Community House which was started in 1946 because many people, most of the baby boomers, do not have the time to seek adult education classes outside of the home community.

Attendance at Community House classes last year was approximately \$200 with nearly 500 enrollments for various subjects in two 10-week work sessions. Classes are self-supporting, fees covering cost of instructors, some of whom are professionals, other amateurs with reputations in the field.

Series five in the 10-week sessions began in April. Registrations for ceramics, silver work, painting and sketching, clothing, millinery and slip covering and flower arranging open March 22. First registrants get first consideration in sections that are overcrowded. These are the only subjects that will be offered this spring.

To Expand Next Fall. Next fall, according to Miss Amy Wild, recreation and adult education program director of the Community House, the craft and education program will be expanded if registration warrants. Some new subjects that will be offered will include French, Spanish, speech, knitting, and an appreciation of the arts course with Detroit Institute of Arts lectures.

Last winter, in addition to craft subjects, classes were held in bridge and social dancing, and these subjects will be taught again in the fall.
