

## SPECIAL ELECTION

### TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a Special Election will be held in the Township of Bloomfield, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at 4200 Telegraph Road, Bloomfield Township Hall within said Township, on Monday, April 5, 1948:

#### FOR THE PURPOSE OF VOTING ON THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS:

A Special Election has been called by the Oakland County Board of Supervisors for Monday, April 5, 1948, for the purpose of submitting to the electors the following Propositions:

#### COUNTY PROPOSITION NO. 1

"Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes, which may be assessed each year against property in the County of Oakland, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to Dec. 8, 1932, be increased as provided in Section 21, Article X, of the Constitution of Michigan, for a period of two (2) years from 1948 to 1949, both inclusive, by one-fifth (1/5) of one per cent (\$2.00 per \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, to permit the levying of a two (2) mill tax for the purpose of altering the present Infirmary, constructing a Hospital addition thereto, and equipping the same?"

#### COUNTY PROPOSITION NO. 2

"Shall a tax of two (2) mills (\$2.00 per \$1,000.00) be levied on all of the assessable property in the County of Oakland, State of Michigan, in the years 1948 and 1949, both inclusive, for the purpose of altering the present Infirmary, constructing a Hospital addition thereto, and equipping same?"

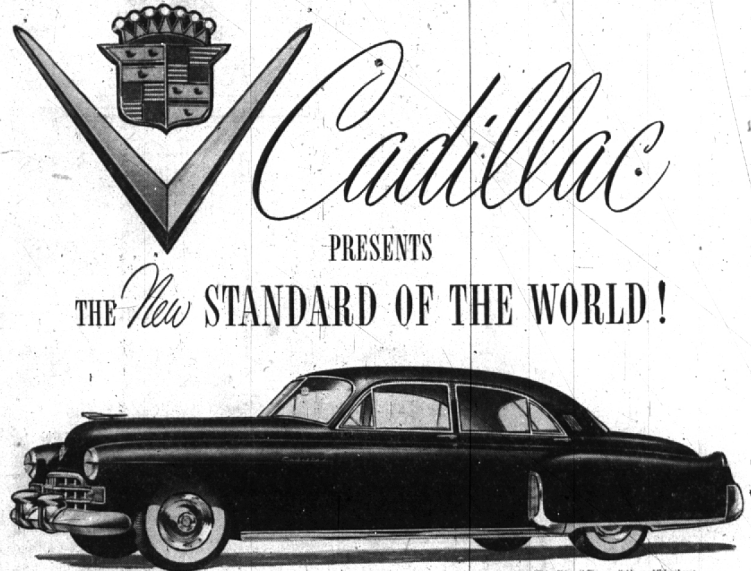

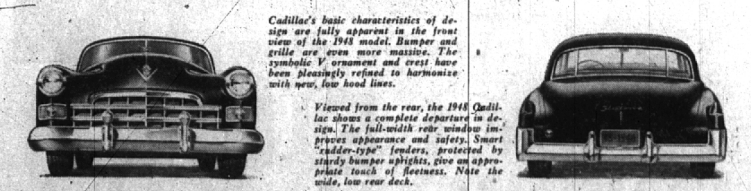
